Exhibition on 'Built-form and Regulations', a mandatory subject for 3rd semester Urban Planning and Urban Design students was held on 2nd September, 2019. Each student, through this course, attempted to understand the impact of regulations on the built form in one specific area of a city, and proposed recommendations for strengthening its proposed character.

Synthesis Exhibition for 'Understanding the City', foundation studio was held on 12th - 13th September, 2019.

Dr Bimal Patel inaugurated the exhibition and had an informal talk with the students regarding the same. The first Semester studio worked on various one square kilometre precincts in Ahmedabad, and the exhibition showcased their research and analysis done through seven weeks of the semester. The students have






Fig 6: Mid-Sem Jury of MUI; Fig 7: Mid-sem Jury of MUP; Fig 8: Mid-Sem Jury of MUH , P.C. Shantanu Ghule

Mr. Chirag Kapadia, Senior Associate Vice President at Darashaw Planning Consultancy delivered a lecture focused on understanding the Surat Smart City Project and the importance of Policy based projects in achieving Sustainable Development Goals by United Nations.

The lecture began by understanding the difference between urbanism,

The talk began with a discussion on what territory is and how people mark their territory in different spaces. This was followed by a discussion on territoriality at different levels. Here, Ms. Keswani gave the students various examples of how territories had been created in public spaces and how different these territories were from each other, through photographs which narrated a story of their own.

The lecture concluded with discussion on how different points of view could drastically alter the intensity of the territory and its photography. This was followed by a Q&A round which fuelled an insightful discussion.






Fig 22: Road Inventory
